Female Genital Mutilation/Cutting Training Module for Canadian Professionals

Led by: End Female Genital Mutilation Canada Network

A series of trauma-informed, online, interactive training modules for professionals working within female genital mutilation/cutting (FGM/C) impacted communities across Canada to spot and protect girls at risk and to give trauma-informed culturally sensitive care to FGM/C survivors. Developed in collaboration with survivors and subject matter experts in the fields of medicine,



mental health, education, social work, and law enforcement.

Safe Outside the System (SOS)

Skilled Trades Workplaces: Engaging and Mobilizing Men as Allies to Prevent GBV

Led by: <u>Canadian Coalition of</u>
<u>Women in Engineering, Science,</u>
<u>Trades & Technology</u>

A multi-provincial (Manitoba, Ontario, BC, NB, & NS) project to strengthen the GBV sector by scaling multiple promising practices to address systemic factors in skilled trades workplaces. This project will engage and mobilize men as allies to prevent and end GBV in skilled trades workplaces through collaborative



partnerships, knowledge-sharing, and employing an intersectional approach.

Duration: November 2023 - March 2026

Women-Centred Housing Design and Knowledge Action Report Led by: <u>BC Society of Transition Houses</u>

A comprehensive toolkit aimed at informing the design of appropriate and accessible long-term housing for women and their children after violence, with a focus on intersectional gender-sensitive and violence-and trauma-informed

design. The toolkit looks at how women-centred housing design has been applied at three case study sites and how women with experiences of violence experience their housing when it is designed with efficient, safe, and accessible features.

Duration: 2021 - 2024



Case Management Foundations

Led by: <u>Alberta Council of Women's</u> <u>Shelters</u>

A self-paced online training designed to empower participants with the knowledge and skills needed to provide survivor-centred care through key practice frameworks including feminist leadership, trauma-informed care, and intersectional practice.

Initiative to End GBV Online Training Focused on Immigrant and Refugee Communities

<u>Agencies Serving Immigrants</u>

A series of online courses developed to help front-line practitioners, service providers, and organizational leaders working with immigrant and refugee communities to better understand issues of GBV and



develop supportive responses for survivors with intersectional identities.

Research Study: The Impact of the Bond Between Survivors of Gender-Based Violence & Larger Companion, Farmed, & Working Animals

The purpose of this study is to research the impact of the bond between survivors of gender-based violence and their working, farmed, and larger companion animals. This study looks at how these bonds impact the survivor's safety decision making,

particularly in rural, remote, northern, and farming communities. This study is looking to interview survivors of GBV with these animals, as well as facilitate focus groups for service providers who work with survivors of GBV in rural, remote, northern, and farming communities.
